Our Background

Annexe Communities began life as Partick Community Association in 1986. Residents campaigned and secured the lease of The Annexe, a former school building in Stewartville Street in 1998 - from Glasgow City Council. In 2000 the charity established a thriving and enterprising Healthy Living Centre. Known locally as 'The Annexe' – a community-led charity.

CHARPERSON'S REMARKS



This past year has been significant and eventful for us, marked by major achievements, transitions, and continued impact within the community.

Perhaps most notably, the Annexe building is now close to being under community ownership — a landmark moment that secures our future as a vital community asset. It reflects the dedication and hard work of many over a long period, and I extend my heartfelt thanks to everyone who helped make it happen.

We also installed a new heat pump system and solar panels with battery storage. These upgrades are already cutting energy costs and reducing our environmental impact. Securing funding was no small task, and we're deeply grateful to all who supported us.

Our key projects continue to thrive. Let Partick
Flourish remains strong, offering support with
cost-of-living challenges and helping smaller
groups become sustainable and impactful.
Onwards & Upwards continues to provide vital
support to volunteers, making a real difference in
the community.

The **Social Prescribing** programme remains central to our work, with many participants reporting greater confidence and wellbeing. A particularly inspiring outcome has been the creation of a peerled group that now meets weekly for activities and mutual support. The **Partick and Thornwood Ideas Fund** has also continued to back grassroots initiatives, helping a wide range of local projects get off the ground.

Following our successful partnership with Glasgow Caledonian University, we've launched a new research project with the University of Glasgow, reinforcing our commitment to community-led research. While some funding ended this year, we're actively exploring new options and remain focused on sustaining and growing our services.

There were also key team changes. In April, we welcomed Kashif as General Manager and Colin as a new team member. In February, Peter Taylor stepped down as Chair after many years of service. We thank him for his commitment and wish him well as he begins a new chapter closer to family.

We also marked the retirement of Julie in April - a respected and much-loved member of the Annexe. Her outstanding contribution to Partick was warmly celebrated, and we wish her all the best in retirement.

Thanks to our staff, volunteers, partners, and community for your support over the past year. We move forward with determination and hope you'll continue to stand with us.

THE ANNEXE CAFE

Summary

The Community Cafe continue to serve as the heart of the Annexe, welcoming both newcomers and regulars alike. It's often the first stop for anyone new to the centre. Under the expert guidance of Tony, our dedicated cook, we continue to serve fresh, nutritious meals that bring people together. Tony is supported by a wonderful team of volunteer cafe assistants, ensuring the cafe remains a welcoming space for all. Rising food and energy costs continue to challenge us, but with the continued support of the Bank of Scotland Foundation, we have been able to cover core costs and keep the cafe running as a vital community resource.



Our Lunch Club offers excellent value, with a three-course meal for just £6. Thanks to the Development Trust Association Scotland (DTAS), we provided 850 free £6 lunch vouchers to those in need this year. The cafe is a popular spot for socializing, with many taking home a main course to enjoy later. Tony's Farmers Veg Soup is always a customer favourite, and our rotating menu keeps people coming back for more.

Our cafe continues to prioritize sustainability and affordability through its participation in the Fareshare supermarket food surplus scheme. By sourcing in-date food, we're able to reduce food supply costs while providing healthy, low-cost meals to our community. This year, we continue our partnership with the Neighbourly scheme, working closely with our local Sainsbury's. Our dedicated volunteer makes daily collections of near-dated items using a specially designed handcart, ensuring that quality food is kept out of landfills. The food is then used for cafe meals, group snacks, and is available for local residents to collect-it's truly a win-win!

Our Free Monday Social Cafe remains a cornerstone of community engagement. It's the perfect space for newcomers to connect, enjoy a warm drink, and find out what's happening at the Annexe. Whether it's sharing a cup of tea, joining in an activity, or simply having a friendly chat, the cafe continues to provide a welcoming environment for all. A wonderful starting point for anyone new to the Annexe!

Summary

Our weekly and seasonal programmes at the Annexe include a range of popular free or subsidised classes and activities. Some are volunteer-led and others are supported by different funders. Activities during 2024/25 included:

ENERGY IMPROVEMENTS





Summary

Annexe Communities partnered with Business Energy Scotland to carry out an energy audit, aiming to make our building more efficient and environmentally friendly. The plan focused on boosting insulation, replacing our outdated gas boiler with a modern air source heat pump and smart controls, and installing solar panels with battery storage. These improvements will help cut energy costs, reduce our carbon footprint, and move us closer to a more sustainable, low-carbon future.





Outcomes & Achievements

After successfully securing planning permission and a building warrant, the installation was completed by February 2025. These improvements have already led to a noticeable drop in carbon emissions. As energy costs decrease, more funds can be directed toward community programmes. Annexe Communities will continue to optimise the systems for even greater efficiency.

2024/25 FINANCE

We continue to strive for financial stability by generating income through café & rental and applying for charitable grants and donations.

Income

- Annual turnover in 2024-25 was £330,181 (£322,122 in 2023-24)
- £586,203 funds carried forward this year including £362,694 fixed assets
- We raised £20,006 from donations
- We managed grants totalling £263,976
- We generated £38,424 from trading activities (cafe, room renal and courses)
- Net Surplus £30,991

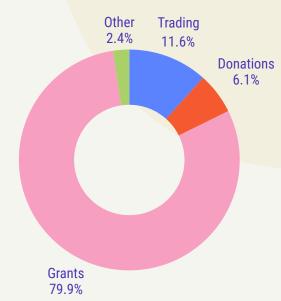

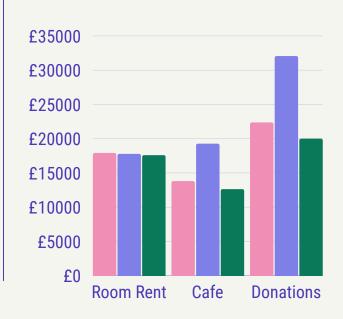

SO(IAL PRESCRIBING

Summary

Annexe Social Prescribing Programme offers support to individuals for a period of 3 months or longer if required. This involves meeting the individual's needs to improve their health and wellbeing resulting in being more socially connected.

Referrals are still predominantly received from GP's plus other health professionals and DWP Partick Jobcentre but have recently opened to other organisations such as Glasgow Life, Jobs & Business Glasgow, We Are With You, SAMH and Let Partick Flourish.

Summary

Partick and Thornwood Ideas Fund is a Participatory Budgeting (PB) initiative funded by the Scottish Government Investing in Communities fund. PB is a democratic way for local people to have a direct say on how public money is spent in their community.

Residents can apply to fund an idea that will benefit the local area. Ideas are limitless but must benefit the local community. **Ideas are put to public vote** and those with most votes get funding

Two rounds of funding went to public vote during 2024-25. A total of £16,500, was disbursed to 17 local community benefit ideas.

Grants awarded in 2024-25 ranged from £350 to £1000

Thornwood primary school fixup, social cafe trip, creative art sessions, knitting group, walking group, community open day, volunteer training, free community yoga, partick film festival, community christmas meal, support to local playwrights and more...

LET PARTICK FLOURISH

PROJECT

Summary

Let Partick Flourish is in its second year, funded by The National Lottery Community Fund Scotland. The Cost of Living Support Group continues, now with a Friday Freezer Service, and we've joined the #Neighbourly Scheme to reduce food waste and distribute more food locally. Thanks to funding from Glasgow University students (via "Save Our Sandwiches"), Morris & Spottiswood, Glasgow City Council Area Budget Committee (Ward 23), and Civic GRID, we've been able to carry out these initiatives. We couldn't do this without your support and our amazing volunteers! In partnership with Partick Housing Association and Partick Community Growing Project, we secured funding to distribute Festive Food Boxes and host local free events. A collaboration between SWG3, our Dreams and Aspirations Group, and Hyndland Primary School led to the creation of the "Stories of the Clyde" mural on Fortrose Street. Cycling UK and Dynamo Bike Shop also provided 10 local people with new bikes and accessories, encouraging more cycling in the community.

Other Activities

Cost of Living Support Group volunteers were invited to the King's Garden Party in July '24, in recognition of their hard work. And yes, sandwiches with the crusts off!

The 10-week Summer '24 Branching Out course – thanks to Craig from Operation Play Outdoors – provided more outdoor opportunities to develop essential skills like fire building, archery, team building, and canoeing.

100 Christmas food boxes - were delivered to local people in need of some festive cheer, thanks to PHA and our wonderful volunteers!

ROBERTSON TRUST

ONWARDS & UPWARDS PROJECT

In 2024-25, we supported 29 volunteers through the Onwards and Upwards project, funded by the Robertson Trust. This initiative mentors volunteers to develop personalized pathways, providing community roles, PVG certification, accredited training, and practical experience. The project also collaborates with local and Annexe initiatives to recruit and guide volunteers, enhancing their skills and employability.

Volunteer roles have had a positive impact on mental and physical health, reducing isolation, building skills and confidence, and fostering new relationships. Volunteers feel valued and more integrated into community life, empowering individuals and strengthening the local community.

One volunteer applied for a relief reception worker role, succeeded in the interview, and is now a paid Annexe staff member. Additionally, peer researchers with Communiversity led four successful workshops on exercise attitudes, including interviews, surveys, and discussions with local focus groups. They presented their findings at a stakeholder meeting.

Dr. T. Ibotson from GU commented: "Feedback has been fantastic. The data collected is rich and valuable – well done!"
